# Sen. Lewis, Del. Bloxom Retain Assembly Seats

Voters returned Republican Del. Rob Bloxom and Democrat Sen. Lynwood Lewis, both Eastern Shore natives, to their respective offices Tuesday in the general election. The tougher race was for Bloxom, a local businessman whose father served for years as a delegate before him. Bloxom won with nearly 52 percent of the ballots or 11,866 to beat Philip M. Hernandez, a Democrat

from Norfolk who formerly worked as a civil rights lawyer. Hernandez took 10,979 votes or about 48 percent. There were 13 write-in votes. Included in the tallies were 564 ab-

# STATE POLICE INVESTIGATE 'SUSPECT' ABSENTEE BALLOTS

Calling hundreds of absentee ballots cast for Tuesday's election "suspect," Accomack County's Republican Party asked the circuit court to put those ballots aside and not count them until an investigation of the allegations can be completed by Commonwealth's Attorney Spencer Morgan.

Gary C, Byler, a Virginia Beach lawyer, was hired by Wesley Edwards, chairman of the county party, to file the documents. Byler did not enter an order for the judge to sign, so the request for an injunction is in limbo, according to a court clerk.

Registrar Patricia White and the county electoral board were named as defendants in the request.

White said plans to count the ballots have not changed as she has not been ordered to do anything different.

Morgan would only say "no comment" when asked if he was investigating the ballots.

Sgt. Michelle Anaya stated the official position of the state police. "At the request of the Accomack County Commonwealth's Attorney, the Virginia State Police has initiated an investigation into an allegation of voter fraud concerning absentee ballots."

# Lilliston Wins Accomack County Treasurer Post With 2:1 Margin

Sixteen-year veteran clerk James A. Lilliston Sr. of the Accomack treasurer's office obtained two feats Tuesday at the polls. He will be the next Accomack treasurer and the first black man to hold the position. Lilliston received 7,449 votes or 67.79% to win over Brandy Custis Childress, a bank manager, with 3,535 ballots or 32.17%.

"We did it," Lilliston said Wednesday.
"My heart is so full. There are hardly
words to express my gratitude. Thank
you to everyone who voted for me and
who supported my family and I through
this process. I am honored to be your
new Treasurer of Accomack County."

"I also want to take a moment to thank my opponent, Mrs. Brandy Custis Childress, for a hard-fought campaign cycle," he continued. "It was a clean, honest campaign for both of us, and I know we equally have the best intentions for our home on the Shore."

Lilliston received the majority of votes in Atlantic, Greenbackville, New Church, Bloxom, Parksley, Saxis, Mappsville, Rue, Accomac, Nandua, Bobtown, Melfa, Wachapreague, and Painter. Childress took Chincoteague by a slim margin and Tangier Island.

Other constitutional races in Accomack county occurred without opposition.

Capt. W. Todd Wes-

sells, of the Accomack County Sheriff's Office, got 9,667 votes in his quest for sheriff. There were 32 write-in votes. Despite there being no opposition, Wessells campaigned hard as if he was in a tough race.

"I'd like to thank all the citizens of Accomack County who came and voted for me," Wessells said Wednesday. "We have a great department. Great men and women work for the sheriff's office. It's a professional department. I'm looking forward to serving the citizens of Accomack County for the next four years."

Commissioner of the Revenue Debo-

rah T. Midgett and Commonwealth's Attorney J. Spencer Morgan III were both unopposed in their first election to full

four-year terms. Morgan received 9,084 votes with 21 write-ins while Midgett garnered 8,772 with 18 write-ins.

# Two Phillips Win Supervisor Seats

Harris Phillips was victorious in his quest for reelection to the Accomack Board of Supervisors at the polls Tuesday.

The District 5 supervisor received nearly 56% of the votes winning over challenger James Rich. Phillips got 524 votes to Rich's 416. "Thank you so much to all of my supporters for having the confidence in me to be your representative in Accomack for another term," Phillips wrote on his Facebook page. "It really means a lot and I promise to do my best to represent every single person ... I want to thank each of you for putting your faith in me."

Howard "Jackie" Phillips won the District 7 seat held by retiring Supervisor Laura Belle Gordy. He prevailed over Miriam E. Riggs with 62.56% of the vote. Jackie Phillips received 989 votes to Rigg's 592 ballots.

"This should be the easiest vote you ever cast," wrote a Jackie Phillips supporter. "Jackie Phillips could very easily be doing whatever he wants with his time. He

chooses to serve his community. That's just the kind of guy he is. If good ideas, common sense, and integrity mean something to you, vote for Jackie Phillips."

Also returned in uncontested races were District 1 Supervisor Billy Joe Tarr with 1,100 votes; District 2 Supervisor Ron Wolff with 998 votes; Newcomer Vanessa Kay Johnson, who will represent District 3, with 848 votes; District 4 Supervisor Paul Muhly with 917 votes; District 6 Supervisor Robert Crockett with 918 votes; Chairman Donald Hart of District 8 received 1,392 votes; and District 9 Supervisor Reneta Major took in 1,125 votes. Fred W. Holland II and Jim A. Evans were also elected as directors of the Eastern Shore Soil and Water Conservation District. Holland received 6,861 votes. Evan took 5,386.

### Martin-Turner Wins School Board Seat: Reese Prevails Over Burford

Janet Martin-Turner is back.

The former school board member, who fought to get an elected school board for Accomack, received the most votes in District 7 and was returned to the post she once held as an appointed member. Martin-Turner garnered 862 votes or 56% of the ballots. Her opponent, T.J. Johnson, received 672 ballots or 44%.

It was the first time voters selected their school representatives. Before the election, school board members were chosen by the school board selection committee members who were appointed by a circuit court judge.

"It's been a process," said Martin-Turner. First "collecting the signatures to put the referendum on the ballot, the referendum passing by a whopping 74%," and then "waiting for the election cycle. I was encouraged to run by so many parents and teachers. When talking with people, so many voiced negative experiences they had with the school division. I hope we can change the climate and be more helpful to parents. The school division should be seen as a resource for parents and students. Thanks to the folks who voted for me and all my friends and family who helped with my campaign."

"As a parent of three students and long-time school volunteer and advocate," Martin-Turner said, "I believe a great school system makes the community better. We need to support our teachers, control health care premiums, and work towards a school system that encourages parent and community involvement. Student success depends on all of us working together. We need to bring our schools and curriculum up to date and make sure our graduates are ready for life after graduation."

She also plans to explore a volunteer program. "We already have a few volunteers who help our athletic teams and I would love to expand on this. I am proposing a coordinated effort by the central office to have a staff person respond to inquiries about types of volunteering, training the volunteers, and placing them in the most effective roles. Of course, they would need background checks just like the rest of the school personnel," she said. "I've been impressed and at times overwhelmed with our community's interest in helping our students achieve success. We need to make the most of our local resources."

At a recent forum, Martin-Turner stated the school board's roles and responsibilities include setting policy, supervising the superintendent, and approving the budget. "On a bigger scale, I believe the school board members need to be very informed. They need to read things, they need to talk to people." If a teacher or anyone else asked her a favor, she wouldn't "promise them the moon and the stars, but I'm going to listen ... You cannot keep your head in the sand and be on the school board." Martin-Turner said.

In the other contested race for school board, appointed District 4 member Gary S. Reese, of Parksley, a former coach and physical education teacher, was chosen. Reese got 659 votes and defeated school activist Connie Burford, who also worked to get an elected school board through a referendum. Burford received 375 votes.

Reese declined to make a comment about the election when reached by phone and said he would be bring statement to the Eastern Shore Post's office in Onley.

Those elected to the other seven seats on the panel ran unopposed and were: Jesse W. Speidel, who was appointed to the District 1 seat and was elected with 1,086 votes; Edward F. Taylor, who was appoint-

ed to the District 2 seat and was elected with 987 votes; Lisa M. Cropper Johnson was elected to District 3 with 839 votes; Camesha Handy, who had been ap-

pointed to represent District 5 was elected with 845 votes; Paul C. Bull, the current school board chairman, got 853 votes; Ronnie Holden, a former chairman of the school board, was elected with 1,345 votes; and Malcolm F. "Pep" White, a newcomer, got 1,045 votes.

sentee ballots for Bloxom and 838 absentee ballots for Hernandez.

"I just appreciate everyone coming out and supporting me," said Bloxom. "It wasn't exactly what I call an Eastern Shore style election as we're used to. A little too much negativity. Too many attacks on character and business etc. All the experts in elections now say if you don't go negative, you will lose, but I just refused to do it. I think the end result was the Eastern Shore looked at my performance in office and decided to send me back. For that, I am greatly indebted."

Bloxom won in Accomack county with 61.6% or 6,921 votes to Hernandez's 38.37% or 4,311. In Northampton County, where voters usually cast their ballots for Democrats, Bloxom was the winner with 2.329 votes or 52.29% to Hernandez's 2,125 votes or 47.71%. In Norfolk, Hernandez took the majority of the votes. He got 4,543 ballots or

63.36% compared to Bloxom's 2,616 votes or 36.49%.

Sen. Lewis was returned to another four-year term with 25,361 votes or 59.52% of the ballots compared to his opponent Republican Elizabeth A. Lankford's tally of 17,187 or 40.33%. There were 63 write-in votes. Included in the figures were 1,522 absentee ballots for Lewis and 785 absentee ballots for Lankford.

Lewis was not available for comment Wednesday.

Lewis, who grew up in Parksley and is an Accomac attorney, won in Accomack, Northampton, and Norfolk City. Lankford, a Melfa business owner, took Virginia Beach by a slim margin and Mathew's County.

The totals were 6,023 for Lewis to 5.173 for Lankford in Accomack: 1.267 for Lewis to 2,364 for Lankford in Mathews; 14,930 for Lewis to 7,424 for Lankford in Norfolk City:

2,682 for Lewis to 1,757 for Lankford in Northampton: 459 for Lewis to 469 for Lankford in Virginia Beach.

# Leatherbury Elected Northampton County District 4 Supervisor

Northampton Planning Commission Chairman L. Dixon Leatherbury was elected Tuesday to the county board of supervisors to represent District 4 with nearly 72% of the vote.

The Machipongo farmer and husband of Commonwealth's Attorney Beverly P. Leatherbury beat out David L. Kabler Sr., a real estate broker, also of Machipongo. Leatherbury received 681 votes to Kabler's 268. The post is currently held by Supervisor H. Spencer Murray, of

Franktown, who did not seek reelection.

"I'm delighted with the outcome of the election," Leatherbury said Wednesday. "I want to thank those who voted for me a well as my campaign committee, which worked diligently. I very much appreciate the trust shown by the voters of District 4 and will do my best to live up to their expectations. I am anxious to start Jan. 1, and have two large projects to tackle next year — work on the public wastewater project and the competition of the comprehensive land-use plan. It's my inten-

tion to be available to citizens of District 4 and would be glad to hear their concerns and questions as they arise."

In another race, Sheriff David Doughty, of the Cape Charles area, won by a landslide with 4,076 votes. Raymond Lee Gunter III, of Belle Haven, a former Northampton deputy, ran a write-in campaign. While Gunter received some votes, his tally was less than 10 percent, the registrar said Wednesday, so those ballots have not yet been tabulated.

Former Supervisor Betsy Mapp, of Jamesville, ran unopposed for the District 5 seat on the board of supervisors. She garnered 686 votes and will take the place of Supervisor Robert Duer, Exmore's town manager, who did not seek another term.

The board of supervisors and the school board in Northampton are on staggered terms so not all the members' terms will expire at the end of the year.

Charlena Jones, who ran an unsuccessful write-in campaign during a previous election, ran unopposed for the atlarge Northampton school board seat held by Nancy Proto, who did not seek re-election. Jones received 3,655 votes. School board member Jo Ann P. Molera, of District 4, and William J. "Skip" Oakley, of District 5, sought re-election in uncontested races. Molera lives in Franktown and is the director of the county's Victim/Witness Program. She received 835 votes. Oakley, of Exmore, the school board chairman, received 685 votes.

S. Kyle Sturgis and Robin L. Rich-Coates ran for the two seats on the Eastern Shore Soil and Water District Board of Directors. Rich-Coates, an incumbent, received 2,951 votes. Sturgis is a newcomer and received 2,402.

A special election was held to fill the unexpired term of J. Wesley Travis on the Cheriton Town Council. Jason P. Van Marter sought the post and won with 114 votes. Former Councilman Greg Hardesty had 32 of 33 write-in votes for the job.

In other uncontested races, Commonwealth's Attorney Beverly P. Leatherbury was elected with 3,760 votes, Commissioner of the Revenue Charlene P. Gray was returned with 3,989 votes, and Treasurer Cynthia S. Bradford received 3,913 ballots.

A letter, from the county Republican Party to Morgan, that was dated Oct. 15, was provided to the Eastern Shore Post by Edwards.

It says Debra J. Wharton, of Temperanceville, "may have" violated state code when she "appears to be filling out by-mail, absentee ballot requests for other voters, submitting those requests to the registrar, visiting the homes of those voters once their ballots have arrived, filling out the ballots, and returning the voted ballots to the registrar by mail. Applications, ballot return envelopes, and ballot security envelopes all appear to be filled out in the same hand, Ms. Wharton's. Patti White, the general registrar for Accomack County, has all of these materials in her office in preparation for the upcoming election. I respectfully request that you investigate this complaint. Additionally, I request that you do so promptly so that any improper absentee ballots offered for this election are not cast."

That letter was signed by Chris Marston, general counsel for the Republican Party of Virginia. Edwards said he delivered the letter to Morgan. He said he was told the investigation was turned over to the state police. A police spokesperson has not yet responded to an inquiry about the investigation.

The letter was submitted with the court request but Wharton's name was marked out with black ink.

Wharton is the second vice chair of the county Democratic Party. When contacted by phone, Wharton said she knew nothing about the letter or the complaint. A copy was emailed to her for comment. She was later contacted by phone again. Wharton wouldn't come to the phone and declined to comment through someone who answered the line.

Edwards said in the congressional race, incumbent Scott Taylor, who lost

to Elaine Luria, "was aware of this problem." Edwards said the problem was in Election District 300, which he said was in Atlantic. The Virginia Department of Elections shows Atlantic as 201 and New Church as 301. In that race, Taylor took Atlantic with 452 votes compared to Luria's 149. In New Church, the vote was 508 for Luria and 459 for Taylor.

The injunction request states "the Republican Committee is a unit of the Republican Party of Virginia. The committee represents its members and the candidates it has nominated to run in the general election held Nov. 5."

Those running as Republican include Del. Rob Bloxom and senate hopeful Elizabeth Lankford. They are opposed by Democrats Phil Hernandez, who is vying for a seat in the House, and Sen. Lynwood Lewis.

No one else in the elections is directly associated with a political party. Morgan ran for election without opposition.

Edwards was working at the polling place in Painter Tuesday morning where he checked IDs, marked people's names off, and gave them paper ballots. His wife, also a worker, directed people to the voting booths. When asked about Edwards working as an election official after filing the court document, White said Edwards was an official before he filing the court document but that question will probably come up again later.

The injunction request admitted the ballots cannot be set aside without a court order.

Byler wrote, "As the supreme court of Virginia stated" in another court decision, "under well-established principles, the granting of an injunction is an extraordinary remedy and rests on the sound judicial discretion to be exercised upon consideration of the nature and circumstances of a particular case. When determining whether an injunction should be issued, courts weigh" if there is an "adequate remedy at law, whether the plaintiff will suffer irreparable harm if the defendant's actions

are not enjoined, whether the harm to the defendant is excessively out of proportion to the harm suffered by the plaintiff and whether there is an effect on the public." He said the party will "suffer immediate and irreparable harm if an injunction is not granted because once a ballot is counted, it cannot be segregated and removed from the vote totals if it is subsequently determined that it was fraudulently requested or cast." He said harm to the other side, is "minimal" "because the defendants can move ahead with all other election processes until such time as the commonwealth's attorney completes his investigation ... minimal administrative inconvenience the defendants may suffer is far outweighed by the defendants' statutory and constitutional obligations to enforce the laws that provide for a fair and orderly election process."

As of Friday, the number of absentee ballots totaled: Chincoteague 65, Atlantic 35, Greenbackville 33, New Church has 208, Bloxom 21, Parksley 26, Saxis 0, Mappsville 41, Rue 124, Accomac 57, Tangier 2, Nandua 152, Bobtown 36, Melfa 34, Wachapreague 29, and Painter 75.

### Indictments Made Public

Sealed indictments handed down by an Accomack grand jury last month were made public Monday.

According to records filed in Accomack General District Court, Brian Markis Handy, 30, of Gargatha Road in Parksley, was indicted on Oct. 7 on counts of distribution of cocaine on Jan. 25 and Feb. 1. 2018. He was arrested Oct. 29. Agent J. Marsh, of the Eastern Shore Drug Task Force, investigated. Handy was released on an unsecured bond of \$10,000. Court records show Handy retained attorney Carl Bundick to represent him.

Dontrell Cartaize Trader, of Accomac, was denied bond in Accomack Circuit Court last week. He is being held on two counts of distribution of cocaine on Jan. 25, 2018. He was arrested recently after being indicted on Oct. 7. A capias for his arrested was ordered Oct. 8.

### Felonies Filed in Accomack

Felony charges were filed recently in Accomack General District Court against three men.

Matthew Mason Jr., 53, of Wharton Circle in Greenbush, was accused of maliciously wounding a woman on Oct. 13.

Trooper D.C. de Nijs was dispatched to a single-vehicle crash on Parsons Road in Accomac, where he reported finding "Ms. Sample" with a cut to her neck about 1.5 inches long. Sample and Mason were riding in the vehicle and arguing when Mason allegedly cut her causing her to crash. The woman was taken to Riverside Shore Memorial Hospital. Mason was taken to Accomack Jail, where he is being held without bond. A preliminary hearing is set for Dec. 16.

In another case, Xavier Ramirez, 25, of West 162nd Street in the Bronx, N.Y.. was charged with possession with intent to distribute between a half-ounce and five pounds of marijuana on Nov. 4. Deputy S. Lenoff, of the Accomack County Sheriff's Office, investigated. A preliminary hearing was set for Jan. 6. 2020. A \$2,000 secured bond was set.

Lenoff wrote in the court file that he stopped a red pickup for not having taillights. Ramirez was driving the vehicle with a suspended license. Lenoff said he called for a tow truck. When invento-

rying the vehicle, "I smelled marijuana coming from inside the vehicle. I opened a black bag on the driver's seat, which contained a vial of a green leafy substance." He then asked Ramirez if he had any other drugs and the suspect directed him to 39 plastic containers containing a total of 6.13 ounces of marijuana.

Michael William Morris, 47, of Kerr Street in Onancock, was charged stealing less than \$500 worth of cash from Da Vinci's Restaurant, in Onancock, after having been convicted of two prior theft charges making it a felony, and burglary on Sept. 30. He was also charged with burglary and stealing food valued at less than \$500 from the restaurant Oct. 1. Officer Thomas Hedge, of Onancock Police Department, investigated. Morris is being held without bail. A Jan. 6, 2020, preliminary hearing was scheduled.

### **Tattoo Artist Convicted**

A local tattoo artist was convicted Monday in Northampton Circuit Court of two felony counts of making written death threats to a county woman last April and misdemeanor assault and battery.

Robert "Buddah" George, 44, of Rogers Drive in Nassawadox, pleaded not guilty to the offenses. The victim was Teena Odom of Eastville.

George was convicted of sending the messages through Odom's niece on April 22 and 23. "You may or may not want to warn vour aunt. I have been given clearance to euthanize her at will. It would be best for her to disappear. If I see her, I have to do what I've been asked and I am not in a good mood." He later wrote. "Means when I see her Imma drop her where she stands. That's twice she has run her mouth about me and other people throwing names around."

George told the police he sent the messages "because he was angry." He said Odom was mad because he wanted to charge for tattoos after doing some for free.

According to the court record, Odom told authorities George was at her house giving tattoos. He "grabbed her by the neck and asked her if she wanted to die. She stated at the time she didn't think anything of it. She said he grabbed her neck pretty hard but she was able to reply 'Go ahead then and do it.' She stated that he then let go of her. ... He did not leave any marks on her neck."

A presentence report was ordered. Sentencing was set for April 2, 2020.

# Council Votes To Increase Chincoteague Occupancy Tax in 2021

The transient occupancy tax rate on Chincoteague will go up from 4% to 5% beginning Jan. 1, 2021, the town council decided Monday night in an effort to raise money to provide services for the growing number of tourists who visit the island.

The change was initially proposed to begin in January 2020. Council delayed the move at the request of rental owners who have already accepted bookings and quoted prices for the upcoming season. The tax is on lodging and campsites. The hike will raise between \$300,000 and \$320,000. If money is needed in 2020 for services it will come from town savings, officials said.

According to the agenda packet, Chincoteague added additional emergency workers to respond to the growth. The tax increase will also help fund additional police and public works services "such as park maintenance and development projects which serve the visiting public." It was noted the hike "was not proposed to fund the purchase of the for-

mer Main Street fire hall."

Ace Seybolt, co-owner of Chincote-ague Resort Vacations and Long & Foster - Chincoteague & Captain's Cove, spoke against the tax. "I feel like the money should go to the homeowners," he said. Seybolt claimed the increase would put Chincoteague in competition with beaches that have direct access. Seybolt also wanted to make sure the tax revenue was spent to promote tourism.

Cynthia Wilder, of the Refuge Inn, favored the increase but was against it happening next year. She also wanted the money earmarked for tourism. "Take every step that you can to bring in those independent rentals like Airbnbs out there listed online but" not paying, Wilder said.

"I don't feel like the local taxpayers should be paying," said Councilman Eddie Lewis, a former police chief for the town. He recently paid a tax of \$25 a night in Pennsylvania. The increase "will be a big help to our EMS and police department," Lewis added.

"You can look up and down the Eastern Shore, the residents here pay some of the lowest real estate and personal property taxes anywhere," said Councilwoman Denise Bowden. "What they (fire and rescue) provide, it's amazing.' Bowden, a member of and spokesperson for the volunteer fire company has driven the ambulance. "Not a whole lot of Chincoteaguers using the ambulance service ... You have to take care of the people who are here but you have to take care of the people who are spending the money too ... As much as we love the tourists, they do put a strain on the services in the town. I think this one percent increase will be put to good use. To help maintain and grow what we have now."

Councilwoman Ellen Richardson wondered how the town's money is stretched as far as it is and praised Town Manager Jim West and other town employees. "You've got to have your services. Volunteers are getting older."

A decision about the corresponding budget amendment was put off for another month.

The council approved a resolution supporting Chincoteague's inclusion

in the Hampton Roads Sanitation District, a move towards having central sewage.

The town's peddler ordinance was also amended. The change prohibits the parking of trucks, wagons, carts, or other vehicles "within the business district or at any location upon any private property without the consent of the property owner ... for a period of no longer than four hours in any day and no closer than 100 feet of any store, shop or stand from which similar merchandise is sold. No truck, wagon, cart or vehicle being used for peddling shall be placed on public property without the consent of the town or other public body."

The mayor and council also discussed moving forward with allowing golf carts on town streets. No action was taken as officials appeared to agree the carts would create more work for town employees due to the need for restrictions regarding insurance, equipment, maintenance, inspection stickers, and guidelines on usage between sunrise and sunset.



# EXMORE SCRAMBLING AFTER DEQ DENIES SEWER FUNDING

Emotions ran high at Exmore's town hall Monday night when Town Manager Robert Duer broke the news to citizens that Exmore had been disqualified for a \$6 million loan from the Virginia Department of Environmental Quality (VDEQ), which the town needed to fix its sewer system.

He was blindsided with the news during an Oct. 30 conference call that left him "perplexed and bewildered."

The events leading up to the fateful phone call began in July when Taylor Dukes, Exmore's director of public utilities, and Sheryl Stephens, a representative of Exmore's engineering firm, Draper Aden Associates, went to Richmond to meet with VDEQ representatives and discuss Exmore's sewer needs.

The pair believed VDEQ's overall message was, "We're going to help you." An Oct. 2 letter from VDEQ stating Exmore's project was "tentatively approved" appeared to confirm that belief.

Exmore was third on VDEQ's list of funding priorities for sewer projects. It scored nearly 379 points, with two other applicants scoring about 399 points each.

VDEQ representatives visited Exmore on Oct. 10 for another meeting, during which town officials explained their intentions: to upgrade the town's sewage collection system and enable up to 900 customers to get service.

Exmore's existing sewage treatment plant would be decommissioned. It can serve only about 350 current customers, due to a Virginia Department of Health consent order.

Future wastewater treatment would be performed at a plant built and maintained by a private company, Aqua, or a public entity, Hampton Roads Sanitation District (HRSD).

HRSD has proposed building a sewer main from Nassawadox to Exmore, Melfa, and part of Accomac, and connecting those towns to Onancock's wastewater treatment plant, which has excess capacity.

The towns would be responsible to build any desired upgrades to their collection systems that would carry wastewater to the force main.

HRSD would accept all future responsibility for sewer maintenance and billing.

It could be a boon to town employees but a bane to low-income residents.

Exmore's town council and officials are worried about HRSD's proposed rate increases, which may be unaffordable within 10 years, when the average customer could receive a monthly sewer bill of \$150 or more.

Duer and Dukes have been researching alternatives such as the private company, Aqua, which would lock in sewer rates for 10 years.

Aqua representatives arrived in Exmore for a meeting with town officials Oct. 28.

Two days later, VDEQ representatives made a phone call to town officials and informed them that Exmore was not eligible for funding because of the consent order preventing new sewer connections.

VDEQ had been aware of the consent order for six months.

That night, Duer held a "911 meeting" on the loss of the \$6 million loan. Around 3 a.m., the sleepless town manager sent Del. Rob Bloxom a text message about his worries for Exmore.

The message suggested a backdoor deal had been made to "take the money we had planned for Exmore and give it to Onancock."

Onancock is still in debt about \$4.5 million for its wastewater treatment

If that debt was paid off, "miraculously, HRSD becomes viable and poor little Exmore gets the shaft," Duer's message continued.

Without Exmore's participation in HRSD, Accomack and Northampton County could wind up with a sewer pipe extending from Eastern Shore Community College, in Melfa, to Nassawadox "for three customers," and it could cost \$10 million, Duer said.

"I'm mad at Northampton County," because it could pay about \$1.5 million to run a sewer line from Nassawadox

to Exmore, "but we'd rather waste \$9 million," Duer said.

"This is akin to a jail we built for 200 prisoners, that holds 90 but we staff for 200 ... a \$30 million industrial park that has one business ... a railroad that we sunk God knows how much money in, that went belly up ... the \$10 million road in Cape Charles," he said.

Duer sent an email to VDEQ representatives Oct. 31 and asked if HRSD also would be disqualified from receiving VDEQ funds if it took over Exmore's wastewater treatment plant and the accompanying consent order.

Duer did not receive a reply.

HRSD's proposed plan for the Eastern Shore is fifth on VDEQ's list of sewer project funding priorities.

With Duer's permission, Stephens called Karen Doran at VDEQ to convince her to leave Exmore on its funding list.

Doran demanded a preliminary engineering report (PER) and a comparison of Exmore's options for its sewer system, including building its own treatment plant or partnering with Aqua or HRSD.

Doran repeatedly mentioned the consent order.

"I don't think I could make her understand that you know you cannot make new connections to the existing plant, and that you have no intention of doing that," Stephens told Duer in an email.

Doran suggested re-applying for VDEQ funding in summer 2020 with a PER and a contract with Aqua or another company in place.

But the town needs the money to pay for the PER.

Doran assured Stephens that VD-EQ would loan Exmore the money at 0% interest.

Duer sent VDEQ a memo requesting \$300,000.

Stephens advised re-applying for the construction funds next summer, even though it could delay the project up to a year.

"You would think the Department of Environmental Quality's main goal would be ... to clean up the environment ... but it's not," Duer asserted.

He had an "ace in the hole" that

proved VDEQ knew about the consent order when it tentatively approved the Exmore sewer project in October.

VDEQ's list of funding applicants, generated before Oct. 2, included a note under Exmore's listing: "VDH consent order dated 10 June 2008."

"Do you understand why I'm hot?" Duer asked the council.

Councilman Thomas Lewis echoed Duer's sentiments. It's "crooked politics," he said.

"I sit up on this council for the people of this town, not to be a politician," and Aqua's proposal was the best for the town, Lewis said.

"HRSD has \$2.9 billion that everybody that ties on to that line is going to pay for," he continued.

"But what happens to our homes' values when you've got a sewer bill that's \$160, and you're trying to buy a house here in town? You ain't gonna sell it. You'd just as well give it away."

The people who support HRSD can afford that kind of sewer bill, Lewis said. "But what can the rest of these people do?"

"That's what's wrong with this whole country. ... Nobody can come to-

gether. ... When you go to them with a problem, and you need help and you do everything you can possibly do, they turn your back on you."

Mayor Douglas Greer asked if there was another way to borrow the \$6 million for the Aqua project.

Dukes said any other borrowing method would lack the 0% interest, and "then we're going to be back up to a \$150 bill."

Duer said he's "disgusted" with "dirty politics."

Exmore officials do not know how or when the town will get the money for its sewer project.

The council declined to act Monday night on a resolution stating Exmore will petition Northampton County circuit court to become part of the Hampton Roads Sanitation District.

Duer likened Exmore's struggle to the story of David and Goliath, in which Gov. Ralph Northam is King Saul, VDEQ is the Philistines, HRSD is Goliath, and Exmore is David.

"We're going to have to take a shot at somebody here sooner or later, but I think right now, we're losing the battle."



For instance, every boat needs an emergency kit. It should have at least three in date USCG approved flares or consider one of the new USCG approved SOS LED floating lights. They never expire. Your kit should also have some sort of orange flag that you can wave during the day.

An extra USCG approved fire extinguisher is always a safe bet under the tree. If you only have a small one, consider the next size up. If the anchor chain is rusty or the line is frayed, replace it or get an extra anchor. You might lose the first one.

Here is a free gift: Call an auxiliary vessel examiner and have them come inspect your boat. It's free and a great safety gift. Finally, how about signing up your recipient for a safe boating class? Contact Flotilla 12-02, and they will issue gift certificates that allow

your boaters to take any class they offer in 2020.

Local aids notices: On the Eastern Shore, Chincoteague Inlet Lighted Buoy 2 is missing. In the Chesapeake channel-lighted buoy 5 is showing improper light characteristics. On the Southern Shore Elizabeth River Channel Lighted Buoy 12 is missing; Elizabeth River Southern Branch Buoy 26 is off station.



# Northampton Students Have 'Meaningful' Community Service

Northampton County is making a community effort to ensure Northampton High School students log the community service hours they need to graduate, resulting in meaningful experiences that inspire kids to go above and beyond the minimum requirements.

The words "community service" might conjure images of prisoners picking up trash on the roadside, but Northampton High School staff teach students that community service is any activity – including a fun activity – that makes a positive impact on the community.

The result? Last year, about 10 students performed 100 hours or more of community service, and they were recognized for their achievements at the annual senior banquet.

The students whose community service numbers hit three digits are usually the kids who volunteer at summer camps and similar programs, said NHS guidance counselor Ivory Turner.

Programs that help students rack up big community service numbers include 4-H Camp, Splash Camp in Cape Charles, Northampton County Parks and Recreation in Machipongo, Boys and Girls Club in Exmore, Camp Occohannock in Belle Haven, and the YM-CA in Onley.

There are plenty of community service options up and down the Eastern Shore, so students with limited transportation can find an opportunity close to home, Turner said.

The summer programs have helped put many students over the top, like Durell Robinson, who graduated in 2018 with about 300 hours of community service under his belt.

At Northampton's 2019 graduation ceremony, audience members were astounded by the announcement that Freddie Elmandorf III had completed 634 hours of community service, more than double the previous record.

But there are many other ways students can earn community service hours.

Students can attend summer school to assist teachers and perform light of-

fice work.

They can get hours by tutoring their peers in a new program sponsored by the SGA (Student Government Association), starting Dec. 1. Peer tutors must be knowledgeable in the subjects they teach and be recommended for the job by their teachers.

Students can volunteer to referee Shore Soccer games or help out at community events like the Northampton County Agricultural Fair, held annually at the old Northampton Middle School in Machipongo, or Festive Fridays in Cape Charles.

Homecoming, prom, and graduation are events that can help kids get community service hours right on school grounds. For example, a student can help organize and clean up after the homecoming pep rally, assist with the homecoming parade, or be the mascot at the football game.

One easy way to get a few extra community service hours is to donate canned or dry goods to the National Honor Society's annual Thanksgiving food drive. A student can earn one hour of community service for every five items donated.

Each student may earn up to six hours of community service per year through food donations.

Northampton County Public Schools require each high school student to log at least 40 hours of community service before graduation, or an average of 10 hours per year for four years.

A student who performs at least 50 hours of community service may be eligible to receive a gold seal on his or her diploma from the Virginia Board of Education for excellence in civics education.

Other requirements for the special seal include a grade of B or higher in both Virginia and U.S. history and Virginia and U.S. government and good attendance with no discipline problems.

Making sure all Northampton High School students complete their required community service hours is a team effort that starts with Turner when she sits down with each eighth

grader near the end of the school year for a transition meeting.

Students are made aware of the community service hours they need for graduation, and Turner advises them to put in a few hours every year instead of trying to do all 40 hours during senior year.

Throughout each school year, Turner receives community requests for volunteers by email and phone. All community service opportunities are announced over the intercom, and notices are posted in the guidance office. Teachers create additional opportunities.

PE teacher and volleyball coach Cathy Doughty coordinates opportunities for students to get community service hours at Kiptopeke and Occohannock Elementary School by helping out on field days.

Jobs for Virginia Graduates teacher Sandra Chandler shows students how to crochet, and they get community service hours by making blankets, hats, and scarves for nursing home residents.

Other staff who help ensure student success in serving the community include high school counselor Kevin Whitman, guidance secretary Tamika

They make sure there are commu-

nity service opportunities for everyone, and "regardless how big or small," each student's contribution is important, Turner said.

It's "phenomenal ... the motivation that they get to do their very best."

"I went in and started liking it, so once you start to enjoy something you start putting more into it," said Smith. "You start wanting to learn more, do more, and eventually I fell in love with it so this is what I'm going to do, so I've got to master it."

He cheered all four years of high school and was once again asked to support the team, this time in the role of coach. At the age of 17, he assisted coach Melissa Mathews but didn't receive official coach status until he turned 18. He aided a successful program that secured numerous district titles during Mathews' tenure, and when she had a baby two years ago, Smith assumed full head coach duties, allowing for all his visions to take shape.

"Once I started coaching now everything that I've always wanted to do I can because I'm in charge," said Smith. He talked of inspiration often coming from another realm. "I have dreams most of the time and then I try to figure out a way to make the dream work for my team and then we put it on paper," Smith said.

Stephanie Williams, region 2A cheerleader of the year as a freshman,

sat with her teammates in the cosmetology room at Arcadia, huddled admiringly around their coach, speaking to his methods. "He pushes us past our limit," Williams said.

Another member of the team, Sahraiya Brown, agreed but also spoke to Smiths' intuition for his athletes.

"It's only because he knows our capabilities," said Brown.

Smith, by all accounts, has a seasoned, accomplished mind when it comes to performances and what judges look for, but this year he also made a concerted effort to turn over some control to his team. The dance portion of the routine was largely their brainchild.

"I was shocked when I saw it. I thought that really looks fun and you all did a good job with that one," said Smith.

At the end of the day, however, Smith has the pedigree to comprehend what the judges seek out of a performance, which often puts a team in the best position to wow and gather trophies. Of the judges, Smith offered what he has learned.

"You know what they're looking for but at the same time you don't know how to perform it in the way they want it done," said Smith. At districts this year, Arcadia fell short of judges' expectations and came in second behind Nandua.

Smith felt like a lot of people were expecting him to be bitter following

the decision. He didn't see it that way and decided to take a different direction in his approach for regionals.

"The judges chose and the best team won, we just gotta work harder next time," Smith said.

He believed his team would be treading on shaky ground if they didn't employ this type of approach, and Smith seems just the man to find positives in a negative. "You just have to keep it positive. I think if everyone looked at it like that things would be so much better on the Shore," said Smith.

"This little place called the Eastern Shore, if we're at each others' throats here we're never gonna get anywhere, we gotta join together," said Smith.

Smith is quite adept at joining people together. His team is very much a coed effort and has been for some time. He recalls his first days coaching back in 2005, when he took on the role of recruiting people for the team. His godbrother was a member of the football team, and Smith urged him to find a few athletes to add strength to his team. They were unsure but initially came out to get closer to the girls. They eventually became attracted to the skill and physicality involved, and in the first year seven players joined the team. Those seven trendsetters set a wave in motion, and since then Smith has had no fewer than five boys on the team at one time.

"They look at it as a girly sport until they get in and realize how hard it is and that it's actually fun," said Smith.

Smith wears many hats and even serves as a guidance counselor in many respects, speaking to the possibility for these boys to pursue scholarships in cheering at the collegiate level.

"Half of these kids need to understand that it's easier for a male to get a scholarship in cheering than it is in football, basketball, or any of them," Smith said.

He elaborated on the point.

"Think about how many good football, basketball, and baseball players there are and there are not a lot of

good male cheerleaders," said Smith.

However, one such cheerleader, Robbie Sterling, bucks the trend. He made first team all-region, and Smith sees potential in him at the next level.

"He's really interested in pursuing it after high school and I really think he has what it takes to do it. He is strong, he's enthusiastic, and he likes to perfect what he's doing," said Smith.

For Sterling and the other members of the football team competing for Smith, cheerleading in 2019 represented not only the opportunity to avenge losses to Nandua on the field but also a loss on the mat at districts. Nandua was joined by juggernaut King William as hurdles to regional glory for Arcadia.

King William seems as close to a dynasty in region 2A cheering as you can get. They have spent the better part of 15 years dominating the stage. Smith reveres their approach and that of their coaching staff, which made Arcadia's victory all the more sweet. "I just can't even wrap my mind around it, I'm still in

shock because we've been trying to beat King William for so long," said Smith.

"To finally do it seems surreal."

It seems as though in some respects

Smith has been tutored by their successes. "Miss Jennifer at King William has been around ever since I was in school and King William has been winning all that time, I've always looked up to her and she knows we always support her team," said Smith.

This year King William were the ones congratulating.

"She texted me the other night and said I've watched you over all the years and you really deserve this, you worked really hard for this and I'm proud of you," translated Smith.

The win at regionals garnered Smith coach of the year honors, and eight of his athletes, Williams, Sterling, Rinasha Reid, Kenniah Cook, Joslin Shaffer, Tyre Ballard, Keith Grinnage, and Alyssa Wessels all earned spots on the all-region team.

Not one to exclude, Smith wanted to point out Grayson Cooper, Joshua Mills, Madison Johnson, Taylor Thornes, and Mackenzie Annis as worthy additions to the all-region team from Nandua.

In addition to all the personal accolades, the win at regionals put Arcadia back in the state competition, being held this Saturday at Virginia Commonwealth University in Richmond.

The competition will be fierce but Smith will do his best to keep his squad loose going in.

"I'm not gonna change much because I don't want to stress them out, I think they'll be OK," Smith said.

"The judges said it was a great routine, we just need to clean up and our mission is to perfect what we already have," said Smith.

Arcadia's win at regionals has put other teams around the state on notice, particularly the other seven squads they will compete against. Smith had to make his Facebook page private as people looked to it for opposition research.

"It means they heard," said Smith.

He does not appear a man intimidated by the challenge or deterred by hard work. His love for coaching is undeniable.

"People don't understand if you don't love coaching you wouldn't do it because it boils down to about ten cents an hour," said Smith. "When you think about how long you're actually at this school per day and how many events you have to go to and how much time outside of here you spend preparing, it's not about the money because if it is you wouldn't do it," Smith said.

He credits former Arcadia principal, Rose Taylor, as a guiding figure in his maturity and ascension.

"I must give props to Miss Taylor, she definitely pushed me, she was supportive, don't get it twisted. Principal O'Shea is a supporter as well, but Miss Taylor really pushed me," Smith said.

A self-admitted knucklehead in high school, Smith believes Taylor saw through him and challenged him.

"I had a lot of mouth, didn't let anybody get anything past me. I always had something to say and she said I don't know about you coaching, so my whole career has been about making her see that I am capable of this," said Smith.

Now Smith stands at the threshold of something truly special for the community. His team gathers round and listens to every word he says, a group he describes as classy and humble. They are a group that's easy to cheer for and seems to feed off the crowds' excitement and more importantly that of their passionate coach.

Stephanie Williams, surprised and humbled by her own personal achievements, sums up simply the man she takes direction from.

"You can definitely tell he's dedicated," said Williams. He, and they, are a team worth following.

The number one team in the VISAA Division III came to Exmore last weekend to face off with the Broadwater Vikings. The game started with a nice ceremony that honored Viking seniors Walt Etheridge, James Gilbert, Wade Smith, and Charles Hickman.

The Vikings started with great field position thanks in part to Gunnar Gustafson who put the Vikings on the Fugua 46. The Vikings' offensive line had quite the first half with great blocking that allowed for plenty of passing time for Brant Bloxom. The Vikings put together a series of runs and passes that ended with a 33-vard catch and run touchdown by Gustafson. They, too, would sustain injuries throughout the campaign but continued to tally yards on the ground and compete with the utmost desire. Ultimately Davis' swan song was cut short in the third quarter against the Knights but not before one final impassioned effort. He strode the sidelines watching his teammates complete a difficult season with great class. Davis spoke of his own skills only when prompted and quickly transitioned to the aspect of football he'd miss the most, the camaraderie.

Forward was a theme prevalent in Nock's postgame comments to the reporter. He spoke not of a team of college football recruits but of lawyers and doctors, of kids

striving to be great in their professions.

"These guys have goals, they are a classy bunch of kids," said Nock. Back during practices Nock set a theme of every pony leaves a print, and speaking to that point some two and a half months later, he believes this group of seniors impressed, both with their attitudes and their determination.

"They knew what they were up against all season, that it would be an uphill battle, but they com-

pushed the line, extending the drive, and Brandon Bibbins seemed to set the tone for the evening on the ensuing play. He took the handoff, ran up the middle into a wall of defenders, but drug more than half of Washington's defense for 25 yards, all the way to the 5-yard line. From there, it took until fourth and goal but Tiair Bibbins scampered into the end zone. The cannon was not yet known to everyone in attendance, therefore stunned the crowd, but it would soon become background noise amidst the entertaining action.

Lineman Bobby Harmon was on kickoff duty for the Firebirds. He handled the duty expertly, and it's worth mentioning the pursuit of Arcadia on special teams all night. Delquan Fitchett, La'Kuan Mcroy, and Jaden Harmon all made great tackles and handled their excitement professionally.

Fitchett made the first such tackle on Washington's opening drive, pinning them deep. The Jaguars led on offense with a flea-flicker pass from Jahmir Woolford to Nazier Spence. It was a jump ball pass down the Jaguars' sideline with Spence just beating

Tiair Bibbins to the ball. The play totaled 52 yards. However, that proved to be their only distinguishable play on the evening. From there, the Firebirds defense clamped down, and four plays later a sack by Brandon Bibbins on Zavian Hall forced a loss of downs.

Arcadia needed only two plays to extend their lead. Tiair Bibbins found space down the Firebirds' sideline after cutting through the hole and sprinted 76 yards to the end zone with no defenders in sight.

Four plays into its second drive, Washington fumbled and Jaden Hope recovered the ball for Arcadia. Just as Bibbins had stretched down the sidelines minutes earlier, now William Scarborough followed suit. He tiptoed, then created distance en route to a 41-yard score. Robert Sterling powered up the middle completing the 2-point conversion, making the score 21-0.

All half, assistant coach Darrell Biddle read the Jaguars' offensive schemes expertly, calling out to his players the nature of the play they faced.

"It's up the gut, get there," Biddle would say. The Firebirds then approached the run with defensive determination.

On the third play of Washington's third drive, Biddle anticipated what was about to occur.

"It's a pass, be ready for the pass,"

said Biddle.

Scarborough responded, stepping into the passing lane, intercepting Hall's pass. He returned the ball all the way to Washington's six-yard line.

Lethon Williams benefitted on the next play, taking the pitch from Collin Marshall and walking into the end-zone. The game was 27-0 with 48 seconds to go in the first quarter. Arcadia's players provided lightning quick speed, the National Guard provided thunderous noise, and the blend was purely entertaining for Firebird fans.

The second quarter opened with the defense converging on Hall in the end zone for a safety, with Kamron Downing leading the charge. Another safety added points to the board for Arcadia after a failed snap on a punt attempt for Washington. To add injury to insult, Hope sped past Washington's special teams defenders, returning the free kick for a touchdown.

The defense continued to flex their might for Arcadia. Ryan Rose helped bolster a robust defensive line, and smiling on the sidelines he spoke to the play of his teammates.

"We've got some strong tackling from this defense," said Rose. Much credit, too, goes to the work put in all season by the coaching staff. The numbers prove what has been evident on the field all season.

"We're sixth in the state for defense in points allowed," said coach Dan Macca. Arcadia added another score on offense going into halftime, following a 60-yard touchdown run from a direct snap to Williams. The game was 45-0.

Fishing from the Shore By Bill Hall



The Atlantic States Marine Fisheries Commission (ASMFC) Striped Bass Management Board voted 11-4 at its October 30 meeting to implement a striped bass management option that requires an 18% reduction in both the recreational and commercial striped bass catch. Each member state (North Carolina to Maine) must comply with the reductions. The state of Virginia had already implemented its own emergency actions, which mandates a one fish bag limit and a 20- to 36-inch slot limit for the Chesapeake Bay recreational fishery and a one-fish, 28- to 36-inch slot limit for the coastal (Atlantic Ocean ) recreational fishery.

Striped bass are now the most abundant species in the Chesapeake Bay and are being caught from the Chesapeake Bay Bridge-Tunnel all the way up to the Susquehanna River. Most of the fish are schoolies measuring less than 20 inches. The size of the fish should improve as the water temperatures continue to fall, with the larger fish typically showing up around Thanksgiving with fishing improving into the month of January.

Lower Shore – Jeb Brady, at Bailey's Bait & Tackle, reported that speckled trout fishing remained good through the week as long as the winds were not too strong. Both bayside and seaside anglers reported trout up to 23 inches. A few catches of puppy drum were made by an-

glers targeting the trout. The structure at the bridge-tunnel has produced a few catches of large sheepshead. Brady said that a few small striped bass have been caught along the lower bayside creeks and off the Cape Charles Fishing Pier but most have been under the 20-inch slot size.

Chris Snook, at Chris' Bait & Tackle, reported that there have been a few sheepshead at the concrete ships off Kiptopeke. She said that the speckled trout fishery has "slacked off" some on the bayside but remains "pretty good" on the seaside. Anglers are seeing some small stripers on the bayside. She had not heard of any reports on flounder action.

Chincoteague — Pete Vasiliou, at Captain Steve's Bait & Tackle, reported that striped bass have been caught in the back bay. Speckled trout continue to be caught inside and around the mouths of the creeks, particularly on the north side of the island. The few anglers who are still targeting flounder are enjoying some success in Chincoteague Channel and along the south side of the harbor. The surf is producing catches of bluefish and a few slot-size puppy drum. Vasiliou had not heard of anybody attempting to fish offshore over the weekend.

Upper Shore – Allan Ring, of the Seahawk Sports Center, reported that action in the Maryland portion of the Chesapeake Bay consisted primarily of rockfish, particularly in the shallows. Anglers were enjoying success by casting Bass Assassins on light jig heads. Anglers are starting to see schooling rockfish in a little deeper water, according to Ring. The larger schooling fish were hitting 1-ounce Faux Jigs with 5-inch paddletails. The schooling fish were found in the vicinity of submerged structures and along channel edges. Speckled trout action on the

Maryland side of the state line had slowed down, with only a few trout taken over the last Ring did week. say that trout action on the Virginia side was still good, particularly down around Kiptopeke, with anglers enjoying success using jig heads with paddletails. White perch are being caught in the Maryland rivers as well as in Tangier Sound by anglers soaking bloodworm baits and casting small spinnerbaits.

# Onancock With Sewer Projects

Dear Editor:

According to (a recent) article, the Onancock sewer plant is operating at 30% capacity.

The Cape Charles plant is also operating at a small percentage of its capacity (last I heard it's maximum daily use, including transient summertime crowds, was 162,000 gallons/day. It was originally designed for 500,000 gallons/day, later decreased to 250,000 gallons per day, while retaining much of the original 500,000 gallon design - and cost).

Cape Charles seriously miscalculated in the projected size of its plant and it is costing their residents dearly in the form of excessively high monthly bills and outrageous initial connection fees. It appears that Onancock did the same.

If none of the newest sewer plants (excepting the troubled Exmore plant, perhaps) is operating anywhere near its designed capacity and the Northampton County pop-

ulation continues to plummet with each census, why are we in such a big hurry to build out a bigger sewer system?

Do we have nothing better to do with our money? And yes, even if we leverage the use of other HRSD customers' money, someone always has to pay for it in the form of higher bills. Despite common misconceptions among our elected politicians, there is no free lunch.

Veteran ID Card: Several veterans have asked how to obtain a Veteran ID Card. There are various forms of Veteran IDs. One can be obtained from the VA health system, or a veteran can have his veteran status placed on his driver's license. Also, the VA has instituted the Veterans ID Card (VIC). This card is a form of photo identification that can be used to get discounts offered to veterans at many stores, businesses, and restaurants.

To receive a VIC, apply online at

https://www.va.gov/records/get-veter-an-id-cards/vic/

To be eligible, a veteran must have served on active duty in the Coast Guard, Reserves, or National Guard and received an honorable or general discharge (under honorable conditions). A veteran's discharge plays a huge part. Discharges that fall under other than honorable, bad conduct, or dishonorable character of discharge are not eligible for a veteran ID card. Obtaining a card is process and the applicant will need to have his Social Security number, digital copy of his DD214, DD256, DD257, or NGB22, and a copy of a current and valid government-issued identification (i.e., driver's license or passport). Lastly, a digital color photo is needed. The link provided will give a step-by-step guide of the process.






